Hello here arethe highlights from the last month:

New Property Assessment Roll for the Town

We will see a new property assessment roll for the Town in 2025. Every three years, the value of buildings, structures, and land within the Town is reassessed to reflect the fair market value of both private and public properties. This mandatory process is carried out by a licensed appraiser's firm appointed by the Town, and it is completely independent from the Town. The assessment serves as the basis for municipal taxa-

Major Work on Passenger and North Streets

Major work is currently taking place on Passenger and North Streets. This project aims to replace aging public utility networks, including the sewer and water systems that need to be updated. The Town would like to thank the residents of the affected streets, as well as those of the surrounding streets, for their cooperation and patience. We are fully aware of the inconveniences these causes, but please know that in the end, this work will improve service delivery and the collection of wastewater and stormwater, helping to reduce rainwater runoff to the Rock Island wastewater treatment plant. The work is valued at 1.6 million dollars and is being funded by the federal and provincial governments.

Preparation of the 2025 Budget

The Town's staff is currently working on preparing the 2025 budget. With the new property assessment roll, adjustments will need to be made to certain tax rates. The Town's goal is to keep any tax rate increase in line with inflation, while also considering the ability of its citizens to pay.

Respect for Properties

During this period of leaf, branch, and garden debris collection, the Town would like to remind the public of the importance of respecting both private and public properties. It is strictly prohibited to deposit leaves, branches, or any other organic waste on a property that does not belong to you without the owner's permission. This rule also applies to properties owned by the Town or other governmental bodies. We count on your cooperation to maintain a clean and respectful environment for everyone.

Improvement of Parks and Green Spaces

The Public Works Department has made several improvements to the Town's parks. At Generations Park, a new fence has been erected to secure the park's play areas, while at Hackett Park, a shock-absorbing surface has been installed to enhance the safety of the play equipment. Additional work is planned for next spring to further improve the safety, accessibility, and activities offered at the Town's parks and green spaces. These initiatives aim to provide enjoyable and safe recreational spaces for all families in the Town

MADAME TOURNESOL'S CHRONICLE

This month I'm talking about electricity consumption. In Quebec, we are lucky to have our own electricity company. That's why our rates are almost half of what they are in Toronto, and almost five times lower than in New York. Just because we don't pay much for our kilowatt/hour doesn't mean we should waste it. So here, I'm sharing a few tips to save money all year long.

You can save money just by changing a few habits. The first thing I suggest is to unplug devices that are not in use. Even when they are not in use, there is current flowing through the cable connected to the device. This is called a phantom load. Most small appliances are usually used between 3 and 30 minutes per day; the rest of the time, they are in standby mode. Up to 40% of the annual consumption of all electronic devices occurs when they are turned off. We are talking here about lamps, night lights, small appliances in the kitchen, television, game console (which is very energy-intensive), air conditioner, etc. A home contains on average 20 to 40 devices generating phantom loads. Take a quick tour of the house and unplug the lamps and small appliances used only occasionally in order to eliminate this form of waste.

Once again, I am talking about saving money during the shower. 5 to 7 minutes should be enough to wash, shampoo and rinse. If you want to take the economy a little further, you can reduce the water temperature and turn off the water while soaping. In addition, a 200-liter bathtub half-filled represents 33% more hot water than a 7-minute shower at a flow rate of 9.5 liters per minute. Think about it!

Heating is one of the big expenses. The temperature can be lowered to 18 degrees at night. No one notices it because we are all wrapped up under the covers.

Caulking windows, doors, electrical outlets is also a good practice to save money.

LED lighting is the best option to save money. A 5.5-watt LED bulb is equal in brightness to a 60-watt incandescent bulb. LED is a little more expensive to buy but consumes much less energy and lasts much longer.

Using a timer is practical for devices that only need to be turned on at certain times of the day, such as outdoor lights and accent lamps.

Another good trick to save money is the good old clothesline. In addition to making your clothes smell good, you save on fabric softener and electricity.
